NOBLE TAKES



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N orth Melbourne CEO, Ben Amarfio, has thanked its members for their ongoing support and says the club will continue to do everything in its power in pursuit of on-field success.

In a year where the industry was challenged due to the effects of COVID-19, the club posted a profit of \$200,000, with the club's current debt levels standing at just \$400,000.

"Our goal is to have zero debt this time next year," Amarfio told the Herald Sun.

"We have wiped, I think, over \$9 million of debt in the last decade. I think it is a great testament to the board, to the previous management teams and previous staff who have done a great job over that decade.

"There is one very good reason why we got the result we did this year and that's because more than 97 per cent of our members stuck with us, despite the fact they couldn't go and see one game, plus Mazda, Spirit of Tasmania and our other sponsors and coterie group stayed on board."

Amarfio, who has been in the role for a year, said he didn't understand the negative narrative that often surrounds the Roos' finances.

"I am not going to speak to other club's finances, but I can speak to our club's finances. At the start of the season we had a debt of \$650,000 ... we have reduced that debt – despite COVID and despite not having any of our members attend matches and all the financial benefits that come along with that – down from \$650,000 to \$400,000," Amarfio said.

He said the club's profit of around \$200,000 was close to the amount made by premiership winners Richmond, which announced an operating profit of \$217,727.

Amarfio said that the club's ability to remove itself from debt would be of huge significance, particularly with the proposed development of the Arden precinct. "(If the club is out of debt), it means we start to build our cash reserves and we start to build our asset base," he said.

"That's what we will be concentrating on and that's the Arden St precinct and the whole urban renewal of the whole North Melbourne area could bring about seismic change for the club and for the community."

After submitting a 148-page document to the Victorian Planning Authority, the Roos are hoping to be involved in the Urban Renewal Precinct that is expected to accommodate approximately 34,000 jobs and new 15,000 residents.

"We are hoping by the end of the first quarter of next year the government will be in a situation to finalise the structure plan and hopefully some of our suggestions and plans will be taken on board," Amarfio said.





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The off-season brought about a number of changes for North Melbourne, including the appointment of new head coach David Noble, senior assistant John Blakey and mentor Paul Roos.

On-field, the club made some bold statements with its approach to re-shaping the list in line with its long-term strategic plan.

Going into 2020 we had the most 26-plus-year players in the competition, and we finished 17th on the ladder, so clearly we needed to make changes and we needed to change the list demographic.

Going into 2021, there are currently 24 players on the list that are 22 and under, a dramatic and exciting change from the list demographics in 2020.

Five of the club's new recruits bring AFL experience – Aidan Corr, Jaidyn Stephenson, Atu Bosenavulagi, Lachie Young and Connor Menadue.

These five players are complemented by the core group of players we have at the club in Jack Ziebell, Robbie Tarrant, Ben Cunnington, Todd Goldstein, Jared Polec, Josh Walker, Luke McDonald, Jed Anderson, Shaun Atley, Trent Dumont and Kayne Turner.

Then we have the exciting young brigade of talent coming through, including five rising stars in Curtis Taylor, Tarryn Thomas, Bailey Scott, Cam Zurhaar and Nick Larkey. Jy Simpkin, Aiden Bonar, Charlie Comben, Flynn Perez, Jack Mahony, Kyron Hayden and Tristan Xerri add to this group.

We've added depth to our youth, in particular midfield depth, through the draft with the additions of Tom Powell, Charlie Lazzaro, Phoenix Spicer, Eddie Ford and Patrick Walker.

As you can see, we have a lot of talent to be excited about and we aren't afraid of the hard work that lies ahead of us.

We also brought in the experienced Heath Younie, who worked closely with Noble at the Adelaide Crows for a number of years. He's joined by Jordan Russell, who spent time as a development coach at the Bulldogs, working with one of the best midfields in the competition.

Every decision we made throughout the off-season was in-line with our long-term strategic plan of on-field success.

We can't thank our members enough for sticking by us through these challenging times. We aim to repay your faith and strive for future success together.

David Noble will lead North Melbourne in 2021 and beyond, appointed as senior coach after a thorough search and selection process.

Noble boasts an extensive resume with more than two decades of experience in the industry.

From 2016 to 2020, he was the general manager of football at the Brisbane Lions and was a key figure behind the club's impressive turnaround and recent on-field success which has included finals in the past two seasons.

Prior to joining the Lions, Noble spent more than a decade at the Adelaide Crows as assistant coach (2005-10), list manager (2011-13) and head of football (2014-16) and was an integral part of the club's eight finals campaigns.

When speaking for the first time since being appointed the club's 38th senior coach (including interim coaches), Noble said he was "humbled and appreciative" for the opportunity. "I always have belief that you need to fit the club, as well as the club fitting you. The North Melbourne Football Club's authenticity, its genuineness, its core values fit me. I believe my value set will fit North very, very well going forward," he said.

With close to two decades in the industry, Noble brings a wealth of experience to the role.

"Clearly the dynamic of the role of a coach has changed in the last five years, I've seen that firsthand," Noble said.

"My skill-set is a broader approach; the capacity to have broader knowledge, the capacity to build relationships with players ... I've always harboured ambitions to coach, let's make no bones about it, but I thought my opportunity had passed.

"The way the club operates, what I've seen over the journey of what the club stands for, the authenticity just really appealed to me."

Noble said he wants to lead a team that makes its members proud.

"We want to be a reliable team that you guys can come in and watch, week in and week out and watch us grow," he said.

"There'll be some frustration, there's no doubt about that, but I've always believed that one of the great values of a member is for you to watch players grow, align to a particular player and watch them build and grow as they come through.

"I'm really confident that we are going to give you an opportunity to watch us play and walk out of the gates each and every weekend being proud of what we put out on the paddock.

"I'm not going to talk to you about wins, I'm not going to talk to you about losses – we are just going to continue to learn. We fall over, we'll get ourselves up and continue to grow and take those opportunities to continue to get better. That is what I can guarantee."





orth Melbourne has welcomed home John Blakey as Senior Assistant Coach.

A highly-accomplished player, Blakey played 359 games including 135 for Fitzroy (1985-1992) and another 224 for the Kangaroos (1993-2002) including the 1996 and 1999 Premierships. He is one of just 12 players to have played more than 350 VFL/AFL games.

Upon retiring in 2002, he went on to spend four years at the Brisbane Lions as assistant coach to Leigh Matthews and tasted immediate success in what was their third successive flag. He acted as senior coach for one game in Matthews' absence in 2005.

At the end of 2006, Blakey joined the Sydney Swans as assistant coach, alongside former Kangaroos' teammate John Longmire and under the guidance of Paul Roos.

Blakey brings a wealth of experience to Arden St, which includes a Swans' Premiership in 2012, and has coached almost every area of the ground.

A well-respected figure, Blakey was appointed Coaching Director and Head of Development at the Swans in 2015.

"I've been fortunate enough to be in some very good programs," he said.

"I was on the back of Brisbane's three-peat up there in 2003. In 2004 they played in another grand final and lost that one.

"Since I've been at Sydney it's been a very successful period as well.

"Knowing how to prepare a team, knowing what it takes to get to finals, knowing what it takes to win finals, is the experience that you learn along the way.

"Hopefully I can bring that knowledge and bring what I've learned from some great teachers in Leigh Matthews, in Paul Roos and my long association with John Longmire.

"I want to help the club get to where they want to get to.

"You learn along the journey what it takes and what's required to constantly compete in September and then what's required to win a premiership ... and its bloody hard, it's not easy by any stretch of the imagination.

"They're (premierships) very, very difficult to win and they take a lot of work and a lot of high standards to be able to get there.

"Hopefully that's what I can bring to the club, some really high standards and some experience in what it takes and what we need to do to get there."

The club champion believes the Roos' group of young players can help build the club towards success.

"A new senior coach (David Noble) always brings new ideas. And hopefully I can bring some new ideas as well to add to that," Blakey said of the North playing list.

"So we're building, but we don't put a ceiling on this group."

The acquisition of Heath Younie and Jordan Russell rounds out North's coaching panel for the 2021 season.

Alongside newly appointed David Noble and John Longmire, the duos join Gavin Brown, Leigh Adams and Brent Harvey at Arden St.

Younie reunites with Noble after accepting a role as Assistant Coach for the 2021 season and beyond, taking responsibility for the club's forwards.

A development manager at the Adelaide Crows since 2014, Younie focused on the management of players, coaches and football staff, and was also involved in the club's finals campaigns from 2015 to 17.

The 41-year-old's coaching career began at North Adelaide in the SANFL (2011-12) where he coached the under 18s.

He was development coach at the Crows for a season, before becoming inaugural coach of their SANFL team (2014-16), leading the club to its first finals series in 2016.

Younie was rookie-listed by West Coast in 1997 where he played for two seasons. He then signed with the Kangaroos in the VFL, before joining North Adelaide in 2001 where he went on to play 183 SANFL games, was appointed vice-captain and won two best-and-fairest medals.

Meanwhile, Jordan Russell joins as Assistant Coach – Midfield.

Russell brings five years of experience in development coaching roles at the Western Bulldogs, before he was promoted to assistant coach for the 2019 season. He moved into a midfield coaching role in 2020.

Russell played 125 AFL games for Carlton and Collingwood from 2005-2013, before transitioning to Footscray in the VFL as a player and development coach. He featured in the club's 2014 and 2016 VFL Premierships, as captain in 2016 and on-field captain in the 2014 Grand Final.

t was a busy trade period for North Melbourne, which made some bold moves to re-shape its list.

Trace

The list management team including Glenn Luff, Brady Rawlings, Scott Clayton and Mark Finnigan remained focused on building a list that will help the Kangaroos play an exciting brand of football and bring them back into finals contention.

Youth was a priority, but it was important to find the right mix of players that would complement the club's exciting proven players.

North acquired talented players from other clubs and made some hard decisions to farewell great servants of the club.

Aidan Corr joined as a restricted free agent, signing a five-year deal. At 26-years-old, Corr is a versatile defender that can play on small and tall forwards. He comes with experience, having played 98 games, including two finals series for the Giants since being drafted in 2012.

The club also secured Lachie Young from the Western Bulldogs, as well as the Brisbane Lions' pick 70 in exchange for the Kangaroos' pick 63. At 21, Young is an athletic rebounding defender who intercepts the ball well and has plenty of upside.

Jaidyn Stephenson and Atu Bosenavulagi from Collingwood were next to join. Stephenson won the 2018 NAB Rising Star Award, his nomination coming after a standout performance in Round 4 when he kicked five goals against the Adelaide Crows.

Stephenson brings excitement, speed and genuine goal-kicking power. He also brings finals experience having featured in Collingwood's finals campaigns over the past three years, including the 2018 Grand Final.

Meanwhile, 20-year-old Bosenavulagi will bring speed, tackling pressure and power that will be valuable in the front half of the ground. Stephenson and Bosenavulagi were brought in with pick 39 from the Pies, in exchange for picks 26, 33 and 70, a trade made possible with the draft hand that was acquired after farewelling Ben Brown.

North also said goodbye to Shaun Higgins, who together with Brown are two players that have been fantastic contributors, members and ambassadors of the club.

Gaining pick 30 for Higgins, and 26, 33 and the Demons' future fourth-round selection in exchange for Brown, along with the club's pick 28 and future fourth-rounder, enabled North to further strengthen its draft hand and bring in more talent.

North Melbourne and senior coach, Rhyce Shaw, came to a mutual decision to part ways in October.

North chairman, Ben Buckley, expressed his gratitude to Shaw and wished him the best for the future.

"Since taking on the role as caretaker coach in the middle of the season in 2019 and then senior coach for 2020, Rhyce Shaw has given his all to the club," Buckley said.

"He has been an exceptional leader and is a man of the highest integrity. His work ethic is unparalleled and we are truly grateful for the time, effort and energy he's put into the role."

Shaw thanked the club for the opportunity it afforded him.

"I'm immensely grateful to the North Melbourne Football Club for the opportunity it afforded me as senior coach, and want to express my heartfelt gratitude to the football department and club staff, as well as North's incredible members and supporters, who together, endured an extraordinarily challenging season," he said.

"Your contribution, commitment and dedication to this club was enormous, and I am deeply grateful.

"To the players – I will forever cherish the relationships we built and the stories we shared, and I'm grateful for the courage and belief you demonstrated along the journey.

"Despite the challenges of the past year, my passion for football remains. The experiences I've had throughout my career developing young footballers to reach their potential has given me the greatest satisfaction and pride, and I hope to have the opportunity to contribute to this great game again in the future."

However, he wasn't gone long before accepting a new role as AFL football operations manager in October.



A host of North youngsters donned the royal blue and white stripes for the first time in 2020.

Jack Mahony, who was selected with Pick 34 in the 2019 National Draft, debuted in Round 4 against Hawthorn. He went on to play the next ten games before suffering a shoulder injury in Round 13 against Collingwood.

His most impressive performance came in the Kangaroos' win over Adelaide in Round 9, where he collected 10 disposals and laid seven tackles.

Ruckman, Tristan Xerri, also had his first opportunity on the big stage in Round 4.

Flynn Perez, who was selected with Pick 35 in the 2019 National Draft, debuted in Round 16 against Port Adelaide.

The highly-touted young defender came off a serious knee injury at the end of 2018, which sidelined him for a year and a half.

He became Shinboner number 1027 and went on to play in Rounds 17 and 18, following his debut.

South Australian product, Lachie Hosie, debuted in Round 10 after he was selected with the fifth pick in the 2019 Mid-Season Rookie Draft.









t will go down as one of the most extraordinary stories in sporting history - Majak Daw's return to AFL football.

Almost two years to the day since his last game, Daw's comeback from a mental health battle and serious physical injuries was nothing short of incredible.

The 29-year-old was told of his return by captain Jack Ziebell in the lead up to the Round 9 clash against Adelaide.

"It's been an incredible journey, and this feat that he's going to achieve this weekend is going to be one of the great stories in AFL footy," Ziebell said.

In the lead-up to his return game, Daw spoke about his remarkable journey.

"It's been a long time. It's been a testing few years. A test of my character and resilience, and how I can bounce back from setbacks," Daw said. "It's the ultimate reward for my hard work personally, and with my mental health battle.

"I realised when all the boys got around me that I couldn't have done it myself.

"There's so many people involved. The footy club, my family, the doctors, my psychologist, strength and conditioning staff, and having the backing of 'Shawry' (Rhyce Shaw) is huge."

Daw had overcome subsequent hamstring and pectoral injuries in his bid to return, before finally running out in the royal blue and white on August 1, 2020.

"There were times when I wondered when my moment was going to come," he admitted.

"The work I've done with the psychiatrists was to not try and take on too much. I just had to take each day as it comes.

"I've played the moment over in my head.

"Who would have thought that I'd be making my return up here and not in front of my family?

"But when I set my goals of making my return to AFL footy, it didn't matter where and when it was going to happen.

"I can't wait to get out there and repay the club back for what they've done for me.

"Giving me a contract last year, not knowing whether I was going to play or not was huge."

Daw hopes that his story of resilience can serve as an inspiration to anyone who might be struggling with their mental health.

"I want to be able to help people and give them hope that they can do things that they thought would be impossible," he said.

"Life's pretty hard. There are obstacles that get in the way, and we are seeing that with everything going on with COVID.

"There are a lot of people struggling, but if you have the belief that it's going to turn, it can. I was really determined to make it back to help other people.

"For me to be able to work back to playing AFL footy, hopefully that gives people hope."

Daw's final quarter goal against the Crows saw him embraced by teammates, as North celebrated his return in style with a big win.

uke McDonald capped off an outstanding season, winning his first Syd Barker medal.

The 25-year-old finished on 183 votes, ahead of emerging youngster Jy Simpkin (140) and hard-nosed midfielder Jed Anderson (138).

After being sidelined with a broken ankle in July last year, McDonald emerged stronger than ever, and bounced back in style.

He shut down some of the most influential players in the game in the early part of the season, tagging the likes of Marcus Bontempelli, Toby Greene and Dylan Shiel.

Often switching roles, the rebounding defender had three 30-plus disposal games from Round 9 onwards and another two with more than 25 touches. He averaged 20 disposals, 4 marks and 2.6 tackles and ranked sixth in the AFL for rebound 50s.

Meanwhile Simpkin, proved to be one of North's most improved players, with the 22-year-old taking his game to a new level.

The number 12 averaged 20 disposals, 3.7 tackles and 4.3 clearances (18th in the competition and youngest in the top 20).

Anderson rounded out the top three, narrowly edging out ruckman Todd Goldstein.

The inside-midfielder averaged career-best numbers with 21 disposals, 2.7 marks and 3.5 inside 50s, to go with 5 tackles and 4.3 clearances.



"She is a strong one-on-one player, and provides a



n 2015, in front of 97,000 fans at the MCG, the North Melbourne Football Club raised a banner welcoming refugees to Australia.

It was at a time where the global community saw the worst refugee crisis in recent history, with more than 19 million people displaced across the world.

International tension was running high, but we recognised the need to be bold and be a voice for our community. It was a tremendous commitment from the club to take such a bold position on a very political issue.

I can distinctly remember the unanimous cheer of the crowd when the banner was unveiled. It raised hairs on the back of my neck. This is one of my earliest memories of the significant role and responsibility of the North Melbourne Football Club.

That day, we leveraged the power of sport to make a statement that The Huddle is a place where members

of our community will always be welcome, no matter their race, gender or religious beliefs. We pride ourselves on being a place that embraces you for who you are.

Importantly it was underpinned by the core values that have been with us since the first day - being real, bold, never beaten and belonging.

It has been a privilege to see young people grow in confidence and self-esteem and be willing to try new activities like going to the beach and surfing for the first time.

My children love the ocean, they've grown up around it and I took it for granted that in the summer you go the beach. I recall the excitement of a bus full of children and young people seeing the waves and touching sand for the very first time.

There was something magical about that day. Young nippers from Anglesea Surf Lifesaving volunteering their time, teaching other young people to surf and

feel confident in the ocean. Muslim mothers having just as much fun making sandcastles, while watching their children ride a wave to the shore.

Come winter, there are trips to the snow and for some young people with an adventurous spirit keen to challenge their physical and mental limits we've had groups trek Kokoda and voyages on tall ships reminiscent of the 1700's exploring remote Tasmanian waters.

Personally, I've learned so much. Young people have taught me about resilience, dedication, creativity and trust. And importantly walking besdie each other to create change in the places where we live, learn, work, worship and play.

For a long time, the media has portrayed young people as reckless, irresponsible and even dangerous. This creates a negative stereotype, stigmatises and isolates parts of our community. For far too long there has been an imbalance and misrepresentation of the stories being told.

The use of digital technologies and social media has shown us the power of amplifying the voices and aspirations of young people. Their insights and ideas to tackle some of the most complex issues that face our society is potentially game changing.

The use of animation to raise awareness of homelessness, inequality, racism and mental health gave a voice to students

from different schools across Wyndham, one of the fastest and most culturally diverse municipalities in Australia. Their teamwork and clever story-telling created awareness about the issues many young people face on a daily basis.

I've heard and seen firsthand the impact of racism and discrimination, and I've also seen what can happen when we are encouraged and empowered to be brave and speak up.

The Be Brave, Speak Up campaign leaves me with a sense of inspiration. Sportspeople and young people working together to create change. Young people educating all of us.

Historically, this group of young men barely spoke up in their class, now they've reached more than seven million people with their message, a message that is shown on the big screen before every home game of the North Melbourne Football Club and was adopted as part of the Australian Human Rights 'Racism Stops with me' campaign.

If the young people in this video are brave enough to stand up for what is right despite the adversity they have faced, then what is stopping us?

It is often observed that refugees and migrants are among the most strongly motivated of those whose societies and countries they depart – by definition they are exceptional. For Australia to continue to prosper locally and on a global scale, we require innovative and agile leaders from diverse backgrounds to help us navigate the future.

The Huddle was established in part to engage, support and empower those on the margins of the education system and provide an inclusive, safe and welcoming environment for them to learn and grow and choose pathways that suit their skills, passions and motivations so they can belong.

Expanding horizons for young people to imagine a future of possibilities and giving them real-world experiences through local partnerships is helping to shape career pathways and inform future change makers.

In just the past two years, almost 200 young people have secured employment opportunities through the mix of our local partnerships. These jobs are providing the foundation skills, knowledge and new networks for young people to kick start their careers.

The Huddle has been so fortunate to have sportspeople, men and women from some of the most iconic brands and sports share their journey and inspire so many young people. From shooting hoops with the Harlem Globetrotters, playing tennis at the Australian Open to learning about sportspeople's most deeply held values and beliefs.

Designed by Emma Kearney, captain of the North Melbourne Tasmanian Kangaroos, True North has helped thousands of young people to discover their authentic self, to build resilience and navigate a complex world. Importantly, it has brought people together to learn from each other.

I've seen players share parts of their life journey with young people that their teammates and coaches wouldn't be aware of about a range of personal topics include sexuality, mental health and dealing with the pressures of being a role model. Equally, I've seen other young people lean in and share what keeps them awake at night. Together they belong.

Fast forward to 2020, and the connection to community has proven more important than ever.

The strength of our community was most evident when more than 3,000 residents living in the Melbourne public housing towers suddenly found themselves in hard lockdown due to COVID-19.

Our staff and volunteers came together with many local partners, including AMSSA Youth Connect, Electrical Trade Union, Citywide, Coles and 7-Eleven, City of Melbourne, Moonee Valley City Council, Victorian Multicultural Commission and the State Government to provide residents with food, medical support and the most up to date health information to ensure those people knew we care about them.

A special thanks to the Victorian State Government, Comwire, Scalzo Foods and the Helen Macpherson Smith Trust, who helped us source and distributed more than 300 laptops to young people who didn't have access to digital devices when their homes became their classrooms.

Working around the clock, our staff and volunteers have taken the challenges of 2020 head on moving 100 per cent of our programs online.

It is not until we stop and reflect on what we have achieved over the past 10 years that we realise how far we have come and how many people we have helped in a meaningful way. Over the past ten years, our award-winning programs have reached more than 80,000 young people from over 160 different cultural groups. We've established teams to deliver our programs in some of the most culturally diverse and fastest growing communities across Australia, and we continue to scale and grow our reach and impact.

But we know our work is far from done.

We will continue to listen to the needs of our community. We will continue to push boundaries and challenge the status quo. We will aim to empower everyone we engage to learn, grow and belong.

I take a great sense of pride in seeing and hearing about the personal growth and diverse journeys of the young people we have engaged with over the past decade, some of which started in our study programs and are now regular volunteers providing support to their younger peers.

With 50 per cent of our volunteers under the age of 25, it gives me great confidence that our future is in good hands. For every person who has donated their time as a volunteer, thank you so much. Without you, we wouldn't have been able to do a fraction of what has been achieved.



Thank you to everyone that has been a part of the journey so far. You have made significant contributions to tens of thousands of people.

I want to thank and acknowledge the significant contributions from the North Melbourne Football Club, Scanlon Foundation, Australian Multicultural Foundation, PMF Foundation and the Reva and David Logan Foundation for your generous guidance and support over many, many years. Your belief in our model has empowered us to grow throughout Australia.

Finally, let me give you a glimpse into our future.

With thanks to the Victorian State Government, The Huddle and North Melbourne Football Club, has been funded more than \$7 million to redevelop our Arden Street facilities to create the most accessible, inclusive and welcoming facilities in the AFL incorporating world-class technology to accelerate educational outcomes.

The redevelopment will incorporate multipurpose community spaces, multi-media facilities, changerooms benefiting women and umpires, a commercial kitchen and new office accommodation for our staff and volunteers.

Construction is due to commence early next year, with doors open from November 2021.



Seven words have repeatedly resonated throughout global communities, '2020 is a year like no other'.

Just 25 days into the year, the first case of COVID-19 was recorded on Australian shores and from there, everything changed. We saw industries and communities grind to a halt for the first time since WWII.

On March 16, the Victorian State Government announced a State of Emergency. Suddenly the community's movements were restricted, which meant The Huddle could no longer deliver its programs face-to-face.

However, in the face of such challenges, we were given the unique opportunity to witness persistence, resilience, and courage.

The Huddle quickly adapted to a new way of life.

Listening closely to the needs of the community, The Huddle brought each of its programs online and created new and dynamic content specifically designed to keep the community active, educated and engaged.

With changes not only to work life but also how, when and where we can exercise, The Huddle worked to provide its communities with alternate ways to stay active from the comfort of their own home.

April saw many milestones for The Huddle, including the birth of 'Huddle Up! with Boomer' which featured 33 episodes and reached more than 61,800 people on social media. 'Online Women's Workouts' launched soon after and continues to be a safe and inclusive environment for women of all ages and cultures to work out from their homes.

On April 27, Study Squad online was launched. Run every Monday to Thursday during school term, Study Squad has seen more than 300 learning hours delivered with more than 120 students engaged and empowered to achieve their education goals.

The online True North portal launched in schools on May 7 and to date more than 50 workshops

have been delivered with more than 400 students participating across eight schools in the Cities of Melbourne, Wyndham, Moonee Valley and across parts of Tasmania.

The Huddle's sport, education and career readiness programs are made possible because of its dedicated and skilled volunteers. Over the past several months, 64 volunteers have donated their time across various programs, contributing more than 750 hours to empower young people to learn, grow and belong. This enabled young people from diverse backgrounds, geographical regions and ages to continue to connect with The Huddle's online programs, building on social cohesion and fostering an inclusive society.

With thanks to the continued support of our partners, The Huddle has also aided young people and families overcome educational and financial challenges.

Over the last several months, Comwire and Scalzo Foods have gone above and beyond to bridge the digital gap some students found themselves in when forced to study from home, by sourcing and distributing 300 brand new laptops.

However, The Huddle's commitment to the community did not stop at delivering online programs.





On July 4, more than 3,000 residents in Melbourne's public housing towers were suddenly unable to leave their home due to a spike in COVID-19 community transmission and high risks to community health.

Working closely with AMSSA Youth Connect, local and State Government, police, health workers, community leaders and local businesses, The Huddle quickly worked to bridge the gaps to provide residents access to culturally sensitive food, medical care and the most up-to-date health information in various languages.

Local businesses rallied together in support of residents in lockdown with long-term partner of The Huddle, the ETU providing PPE equipment to staff, volunteers and residents while Coles and 7-Eleven donated more than 800 community food boxes while Citywide provided recycling support to AMSSA Youth Connect.

In a time of need, our local community and our partners came together in a show of strength and solidarity. It is due to their generosity and willingness to go above and beyond that we were able to deliver real outcomes for members of our community and empower them to overcome the new challenges they faced.

Looking forward, communities on a global and local level have a long road of recovery ahead. But, as we recover and adjust to a new norm, our commitment to the community remains the same.

The Huddle will continue to listen and amplify the needs of young people and our community. We will continue to adapt and change as our circumstances do and we will continue to empower young people and their families to learn, grow and belong.

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
